The Gulf Studies Center aims to produce an edited volume based on the scholarly work presented by the speakers.
















Talk by Dr. Ahmed Abozaid

Students' Visit to Mediation Exhibition



On December 9, 2025, PhD students from the Gulf Studies Program visited the Pathway to Peace exhibition as part of Dr. Pinar Akpinar's Foreign Policy Analysis of the Gulf States course. The guided tour enabled students specializing in Gulf and mediation studies to engage directly with Qatar's mediation and peacebuilding efforts, effectively linking classroom theory with real-world diplomatic practice. By presenting mediation as an evolvina foreign policy tool grounded in dialogue and facilitation, the exhibition deepened students' understanding of how peace processes operate in practice highlighted the value of experiential learning in advanced graduate training. Pathway to Peace is а permanent exhibition curated by the International Media Office (IMO) of the State of Qatar and hosted at the Sheraton Grand Doha Resort & Convention Hotel, a symbolic venue where many of Qatar's mediation efforts have taken place, underscoring the power of mediation to save lives and build sustainable peace.
